Ten die in Marathwada

Mumbai: At least ten persons from Marathwada region of Maharashtra pounded by heavy rains lost their lives over the last three days, as per primary assessment by authorities.

After battering the region for three consecutive days since September 1, the rain took a break after Tuesday evening.

The recent heavy rainfall damaged crops on nearly 11.67 lakh hectares of land in seven districts, with Nanded witnessing the maximum impact of nature's fury.

Five individuals from Chhatrapati Sambhajinagar, two in Hingoli, and one each in Latur, Beed, and Jalna died since September 1, as per the primary survey report.

Krishna Janmabhoomi Land **Muslim side** moves SC

New Delhi: The Muslim side has moved the Supreme Court against the Allahabad High Court order rejecting their plea challenging the maintainability of 18 cases related to the Krishna Janmabhoomi-Shahi Idgah dispute in Mathura.

The plea challenging the August 1 order of the high court has been filed in the apex court by the Committee of Management Trust. Shahi Masjid Idgah through advocate RHA Sikander.

On August 1, the high court rejected the plea challenging the maintainability of 18 cases related to the temple-mosque dispute in Mathura, and ruled that the "religious character" of Shahi Idgah needs to be determined.

The high court had dismissed the Muslim side's contention that the suits filed by Hindu litigants relating to the dispute over the Shahi Idgah mosque complex adjoining the Krishna Janmabhoomi temple and violated the Places of Worship (Special Provisions) Act -- and were thus not maintainable.

The 1991 Act prohibits changing the religious character of any shrine from what existed on the day of the country's Independence. It exempted only the Ram Janmabhoomi-Babri Masjid dispute from its purview.

No pension to defector MLAs

Shimla: In an unprecedented move, the Himachal Pradesh Assembly on Wednesday passed an amended Bill to stop pensions of members disqualified under the anti-defection

Tightening the noose on defectors, Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu on Tuesday introduced the Himachal Pradesh Legislative Assembly (Allowances and Pension of Members) Amendment Bill, 2024, that aims to deter and discourage MLAs from defecting parties by discontinuing

their pension.

"A person shall not be entitled to a pension under the Act if he has been disqualified at any point of time under the tenth schedule of the Constitution (anti-defection law)." The Bill also includes provisions for recovery of pension drawn by legislators who are disentitled under this amendment.

Under Section 6B of the Act, every legislator who has served for any period up to five years is entitled to a pension of Rs 36,000 per month. Section 6(e) further states that every legislator

will be given an additional pension of Rs 1,000 per month for every year in excess of the period of the first

Man detained for protest appeal

Mumbai: A 27-year-old social media influencer was detained by the Mumbai Police on Wednesday for allegedly posting inflammatory content in support of Kangana Ranaut-starrer "Emergency" movie, and trying to incite discord between the Sikh and Muslim communities.

The detained individual has been identified as Faizan Abdul Zameer Ansari, a police official said.

According to a police official, Ansari's posts were potentially designed to create communal tension.

His message, which in-

cluded an invitation for a protest purportedly organised by the Muslim community, was associated with the film's release.

The controversial post claimed that thousands of Muslims from Mumbai would gather outside Mahim dargah to protest on Wednesday in support of the film, the police official said, adding that the social media post also included Ansari's mobile number, which drew the attention of the police.

An FIR was registered against Ansari under relevant sections of the Bharatiya Nyay Sanhita (BNS) for spreading hatred among communities at Mahim police station and further investigation is underway.

Earlier in the day, the Bombay High Court refused to issue any orders to the censor board for the grant of a certificate for 'Emergency', which means the film is likely to miss its scheduled release on September 6.

The biographical drama is caught up in a controversy after Sikh organisations, including the Shiromani Akali Dal, alleged misrepresentation of the community and projecting incorrect histori-

Complaints Of Sexual Harassment In Industry

Karnataka film fraternity urges CM to form panel

Bengaluru: Over 100 film professionals on Wednesday urged the Karnataka government to appoint a committee led by a retired judge to address the sexual harassment issue in the Kannada film industry.

In a letter addressed to Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah, sent on behalf of Film Industry for Rights & Equality (FIRE), 153 film professionals, including actors Kiccha Sudeep and Ramya, demanded the government to "conduct a thorough investigation into the systematic issues faced by women in KFI, including

sexual harassment". The letter, dated September 4, comes in the wake of the Justice K Hema Committee report that is taking the Malay-

alam film industry by

storm with many survivors coming forward to name the preparators.

FIRE, led by film director, screenwriter and lyricist Kavitha Lankesh, has been pushing for reform in the Kannada film industry following the #metoo wave as well.

FIRE also urged the government to "develop and recommend policies to ensure a healthy and equitable work environment for all women in the industry."

It wanted a retired judge of the High Court or Supreme Court "who has demonstrated a strong commitment to gender justice over her/his years of service be appointed to head the committee."

Incidentally, FIRE has been instrumental in establishing India's first-

ever film industry Internal Complaints Committee (ICC), advocating for survivors of

sexual harassment. "We recognise that more comprehensive measures are needed to create a safe and equitable working environment for all women in the industry," said the letter.

Despite many attempts to reach Lankesh over the

phone, she was unavailable for comment.

The film fraternity in Kerala is already under fire after the Justice Hema Committee report highlighted several instances of sexual harassment in the industry. A similar kind of complaints are voiced in Tamil and Bengali film industry as well.



15 companies interested in vaanvan

Mumbai: Top conglomerates such as Adani Ports and SEZ Ltd, Larsen & Toubro, Rail Vikas Nigam Ltd etc. are among the 15 companies that have filed Expression of Interest (EoI) applications for Vadhvan Port on PPP under Hybrid Annnuity Model (HAM).

Prime Minister Narendra Modi laid the foundation stone of the new port on August 30.

The EoI applications were invited for development and maintenance of land to be created offshore of Vadhavan coast by dredging, reclamation and construction of offshore protection bund for the proposed port. The applications were opened on September 2, 2024.

"We have received applications from 15 interested parties and after most of the parties expressed willingness, we

opened the same. We will now analyse the demands and firm up the proposal before sending it to the Ministry of Finance through the Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways (MoPSW)," an official with JNPA said.

"Once the proposal is approved, we will float the tenders. The entire process should take 2-3 months," he said. While the pre-application conference was held on August 1, 2024, the last date for submission of Eol was August 20, 2024.

The port had received clearance from the Union Cabinet on June 19, 2024 which also approved the establishing road connectivity between the port and National Highways by the Ministry of Road Transport and Highway besides rail linkage to existing rail network and the upcoming Dedicated Freight Corridor (DFC) by the Ministry of Railways.

Jaydeep Apte arrested

Mumbai: The Sindhudurg Police have arrested contractor Jaydeep Apte from Thane district He was booked over the collapse of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj's statue at Rajkot fort, an official said on Wednesday.

Police had been searching for 24-year-old Apte since the day of the collapse on August 26, but he has remained untraceable. Seven teams were formed for his search.

The Sindhudurg police have also issued a Look Out Circular (LOC) against Apte to prevent him from leaving the country through sea ports, airports and all other exit points, he said.

Teams of Sindhudurg police are searching for him at places including Mumbai Thane, Sindhudurg and Kolhapur. Some of the teams are using technical help to apprehend the accused, the official said.

A police team had visited Apte's residence at Dudhnaka in Kalyan of Thane district, but it was locked, he said.

Apte had executed the contract to make the 35-foot statue of the Maratha warrior king that was unveiled by Prime Minister Narendra Modi at the fort in Malvan tehsil on Navy Day, December 4, last year.

Pawar on a mission to dent Mahayuti

Mumbai: At 83, he had to rebuild the party from scratch just nine months before the Lok Sabha election, with his back to the wall, he came with flying colours. A lynchpin for the anti-BJP opposition alliance at the national level and a key architect of the Maharahtra Vikas Aghadi (MVA) in the state Sharad Pawar has started making dent in BJP and nephew Ajit Pawar-led NCP, the party founded by the octogenarian. He is confident of dislodging Mahayuti dispensation in Maharashtra The senior leader kicked

off this mission prior to the Parliament elections. Now he is busy exploiting the fault lines, a 'kamjor kadi' in the Ajit's NCP and the saffron camp. For this he is touring the state and is on lookout for leaders from both the outfits who are ready to switch over. As a result, not only the dis-

gruntled elements but leaders with mass following are also in touch with Sharad Pawar. On Tuesday NCP (SP) boss Sharad Pawar kicked off his Kolhapur mission by inducting BJP leader Raje Samarjeetsinh Ghatge, a royal descendant of Chhatrapati Shahu Maharaj, who joined NCP in a public rally. This was a major blow to the BJP as Ghatge was very closely associated with the Deputy Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis. Pawar, who is currently camping in Kolhapur, has been focusing on the south Maharashtra district to consolidate his party. He met a bunch of senior leaders from the district, many of them willing to fight upcoming elections as NCP(SP) candidates

Another BJP leader and former Minister Harshvardhan Patil, is all set to join NCP(SP) very soon. Patil wants to contest from Indapur in Pune district but

OBC community who is in presently BJP office bearer is likely to be pitted against Chhagan Bhujbal.

It may be recalled that during Lok Sabha polls, Pawar personally met Vijaysinh Mohite Patil, who was in BJP and was at loggerheads with party's MP Ranjeetsinh Naik Nimbalkar. In one meeting Pawar convience Mohite Patil and fielded Dhairyasheel Mohite Patil as a NCP candidate from Madha. Vijavsinh's clout and influence ensured a smooth victory for the NCP(SP) candidate. Similarly Nilesh Lanke who was with Ajit Pawar, joined senior Pawar's party contested Lok Sabha election from Ahmednagar constituency and won. Recently, Sharad Pawar

predicted that the opposition will win 225 of 288 seats in upcoming assembly elections. This has virtually created flutter in the opposition BJP camp. The MVA stunned the ruling Mahayuti, which comprises BJP, Eknath Shinde's Shiv Sena, and Ajit Pawar's NCP, by winning 30 of the 48 Lok Sabha seats in Maharashtra in the 2024 polls. Pawar has said that the opposition won just six of the 48 Lok Sabha seats in the state in 2019, but this figure rose to 31 in 2024. "Maharashtra is in the wrong hands. In the Lok Sabha polls, people have given results that indicate change. Looking at this equation the opposition will win 225 of the 288 seats in the assembly polls," the NCP leader has categorically said. Against this backdrop, news is doing the rounds that danger bells are ringing for the

Release Of 'Emergency' No direction on certificate immediately

Mumbai: Kangana Ranaut's film 'Emergency' didn't get any relief on Wednesday from the Bombay High Court which refused to pass any order in the wake of a directive by the Madhya Pradesh HC directing CBFC to consider objections to the movie before certifying it.

The film was scheduled to release on September 6 but will now be pushed back for two weeks as the HC directed the censor board to consider the objections raised against the film and then certify it by September 18.

A division bench of Justices B.P. Colabawalla and Firdosh Pooniwalla on Wednesday accepted the producer's contention that the certificate was kept

ready but not issued. The bench said once the

certificate was issued online to the makers of the film, the CBFC's contention that the certificate was not issued as it was not signed by the chairperson is incorrect. The court, however, noted

"The Madhya Pradesh HC has given the CBFC a direction. If we give any relief today then it would be directly in contravention to that order. We will be asking CBFC to breach another HC order if we pass any order today. We cannot do that. Judicial propriety demands that of us," the bench said.

Agriculture risk could trigger food inflation, say experts

Mumbai: Despite an overall improvement in performance of monsoon compared to last year, India's agriculture sector continues to remain at risk due to regional disparities in rainfall that could threaten inflation, said a note by way of Monsoon update by rating agency - CareEdge.

Key regions particularly in Northern India and the Gangetic plains, continue to experience significant deficit in rainfall. As of the last week of August, Kharif sowing is 97% complete. However, compared to re-

cent years with normal monsoons (2021 and 2022), the sowing of pulses and some oilseeds has lagged, potentially adding to price pressures given their import dependence, the note

Global edible oil prices have recently exited a deflationary period due to global factors, and the risk of these prices passing through to the domestic consumption basket remains a key concern.

Additionally, lower reservoir levels, reflecting the rainfall pattern in some regions like northern India and few states in east India

could impede the prospects for Rabi sowing, which largely depends on irrigation, the note said.

At this juncture, monitoring food prices is crucial, especially as the base effect is expected to turn adverse ahead of the early festive season this year.

These factors could slow the moderation of already high food inflation, increasing the risk of entrenching higher inflation expectations. Recent surveys indicate that since March 2024, inflation expectations have risen while consumer confidence has trended downwards.

Services sector activity hits 5-month high

New Delhi: India's services sector activity growth touched a five-month high in August on stronger rise in new work orders, while payroll numbers rose solidly as companies remained upbeat regarding the economic outlook, a monthly survey said on Wednesday.

The seasonally adjusted HSBC India Services Business Activity Index rose from 60.3 in July to 60.9 in August, registering the fastest expansion since March and was largely supported by productivity gains and positive demand trends.

In the Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) parlance, a print above 50 means expansion, while a score below 50 denotes contraction.

"The Composite PMI for India continued to show strong growth in August, driven by accelerated business activity in the service sector, which experienced its fastest expansion since March. This growth was largely fuelled by an increase in new orders, particularly domestic orders," said Pranjul Bhandari, Chief India Economist at HSBC.



On the price front, input costs rose at their slowest pace in six months, with both the manufacturing and service sectors exhibiting the same pattern. Consequently, output price inflation receded in August.

"The overall rate of charge inflation across India's service economy was moderate. The rise was also slower than that seen in July," the survey noted.

However, the outlook for the Indian private sector over the next year has moderated, reaching its lowest level in 15 months due to competitive pressure, although the Future Output Index remained above the

long-term average. According to the survey, employment levels remained robust, though there was a slight decrease in the pace of hiring compared to July.

Two-wheeler makers should provide helmets

New Delhi: Union minister Nitin Gadkari on Wednesday said twowheeler manufacturers should provide helmet to the purchaser of the vehicle at a discount or reasonable rate as many people die in road accidents just for not wearing helmets.

Addressing an event

here, Gadkari said 50,029 people lost their lives in accidents in the country in 2022 when they were not wearing helmets. "I am thinking of requesting two-wheeler manufacturers... if they can give some reasonable discount on helmets to the purchaser of the vehicle then we can save the life of the people," he said.

The road transport and highways minister also stressed on the need to plan the parking arrangement for school buses.Noting that the Motor Vehicles (Amendment) Act, 2019 has enforced hefty penalties on traffic offences, he said, "But actually, effective enforcement is also a big challenge."Gadkari said his ambition is to start driving school in every taluka of the country.



Insolvency resolution deadline extended

has extended the insolvency resolution deadline for grounded airline Go First for the fourth time and directed the suspended board of the debt-ridden firm to file a reply within three weeks.

A two-member bench of the Delhi-based National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT) issued notice to the suspended management of the company on Tuesday and listed the matter for hearing in the first week of October.

The resolution professional of Go First had moved the application under section 33 (1) of the Insolvency and Bankruptcv Code for the liquidation of Go First after the lenders failed to find a reasonable buyer within the

stipulated time frame. During the proceedings, counsel appearing for Go First informed the NCLT that the Committee of Creditors decided to liquidate the company with a majority vote. This was the fourth extension for Go First to complete the

New Delhi: Corporate Corporate Insolvency Resdispute tribunal NCLT olution Process (CIRP), as the airline has been struggling to find a buyer.

In June, NCLT had granted an extension of 60 days to the grounded air carrier for completing the insolvency process.

While granting the latest extension on Tuesday, the NCLT's Delhi bench said: "This is the final extension.'

The Insolvency & Bankruptcy Code (IBC) mandates completion of CIRP within 330 days, which includes the litigation period.As per Section 12(1) of the Code, CIRP should be completed within 180

However, the maximum time within which CIRP must be mandatorily completed, including any extension or litigation period, is 330 days, failing which a corporate debtor is sent for liquidation.

The NCLT, on May 10, 2023, admitted the plea of Go First -- which stopped operating flights on May 3 -- to initiate voluntary insolvency resolution proceedings.

Investors put in bids for GIC New Delhi: Institutional

investors on Wednesday put in bids worth about Rs 2,300 crore in the government's offer for sale (OFS) in General Insurance Corporation (GIC Re).

"Offer for Sale in GIC got a positive response today from Non-Retail investors. Issue subscribed 1.08 times of base size. Govt has decided to exercise the green shoe option," DIPAM Secretary Tuhin Kanta Pandey said in a post on X.

The government is sell-

ing up to 5.95 crore equity shares or 3.39 per cent stake in GIC Re at a floor price of Rs 395 a share. The OFS also has a green shoe ontion to allow the government to retain over-subscription of up to an additional 3.39 per cent, taking the total issue size to 6.78 per cent. The first government disinvestment of the current fiscal -- the OFS of GIC RE -- saw a slow start on Wednesday, with the issue getting fully subscribed just before the close of market hours.

The OFS received bids from non-retail investors for 5.81 crore shares, which is 108.49 per cent of the over 5.35 crore shares reserved for them, as per BSE data.

Bodies of two crew members found



Porbandar: Of the three crew members who went missing after an Indian Coast Guard (ICG) helicopter crashed into the Arabian Sea off Guiarat coast, the bodies of its pilot and a diver have been recovered while search for the third one is still on, officials said on Wednesday.

The bodies of Commandant Vipin Babu and diver Karan Singh were recovered on Tuesday night while search is still on to trace another pilot, Rakesh Rana, said Coast Guard spokesperson, Amit Uniyal.

"Of the total four crew members on board the ICG's advanced light helicopter (ALH), diver Gautam Kumar was rescued soon after the incident while a search was on for three others - one pilot and two divers. On Tuesday night, the bodies of pilot Vipin Babu and diver Karan Singh were recovered," he

"Another pilot, Rakesh Rana, is still missing. We have deployed four ships and an aircraft to locate him. Wreckage of the helicopter has been found," he added.

The incident occurred on Monday night after the ICG launched an operation around 11 pm to evacuate an injured crew member on board a tanker which was sailing close to Porbandar.

Meanwhile, Navi Bandar police station of Porbandar on Tuesday night filed an accidental death report after the recovery of two dead bodies from the sea

As per the report, the Coast Guard helicopter carrying four crew members crashed into the sea nearly 30 nautical miles from the coast due to unknown reasons during a medical emergency rescue mission mid sea.

It added that two persons have died while the rescued crew member Gautam Kumar is currently admitted to a hospital.

Chargesheet against Darshan

Adityanath made the remark responding to the Samajwadi Party chief's Tuesday comment on bulldozer, the machine which has become emblematic of his style of governance.

"As soon as the Samajwadi government is formed in 2027, the bulldozers of the entire state will head towards Gorakhpur," Yadav had said.

Adityanath said only those with a "bulldozer-like capability" can operate it. "Today these people have

come back in a new form to mislead the public. Not everyone's hands can fit on a bulldozer. It requires both heart and mind. Only someone who has a bulldozerlike capability and determination can operate it. Those



who grovel before the rioters will not be able to stand in front of a bulldozer," he said while addressing an appointment letter distribution event.

The CM also made a pun on Yadav's nickname saying, "Now 'Tipu' is also trying to become a 'Sultan'."

Wolves' revenge tendency behind spate of attacks

Bahraich: As Uttar Pradesh's Bahraich grapples with wolf terror, an expert has said the series of attacks on the residents of Mehsi tehsil might be due to wolves "seeking revenge" for possible habitat loss or killing of their cubs.

Wolf attacks on humans, including children, have been taking place in Bahraich since March but they saw a spike from July 17 onwards during the rainy season.

Till September 2, eight people, including seven children, have died in these attacks while about 36, including women, children and elderly, have been injured.

Gvan Prakash Singh, a retired officer of the Indian Forest Service (IFS) and a former forest officer at Katarniaghat Wildlife Division of Bahraich district, said wolves, unlike other predatory animals, have a tendency to seek revenge. "On the basis of my experience, I can say that wolves have a tendency to take revenge. In the



past, humans must have caused some kind of harm to their cubs due to which these attacks are happening as revenge," Singh, who is serving as an adviser to the Wildlife Trust of India after retirement, told PTI.

Singh said a similar pattern has emerged in Bahraich as in January and February, two wolf cubs were crushed under the wheels of

Around 25 years ago, more than 50 children were killed by wolves in the basin area of the Sai river in Jaunpur and Pratapgarh districts of Uttar Pradesh. Upon investigation, it was found that some children had killed two wolf cubs in a den. The parents of the wolf cubs became very aggressive and began attacking humans living in the area. The forest department launched a campaign and some

Nine teams deployed

A team of nine shooters has been deployed in Bahraich forest here to shoot a man-eating wolf at Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath's order, an officer on Wednesday said.

Six of the shooters are from the forest department and three from police, Bahraich's Divisional Forest Officer Ajit Pratap Singh told PTI.

"The forest department has divided the entire operation into three major sections. Apart from three 'special teams' of three sections, one team has been kept in reserve. Each special section has been given three shooters," he said.

The officer said the team's main task is to identify the man-eating wolf and transfer it to a zoo or shoot it.


As the furious wolves began attacking local residents, several of them were caught and released in Chakia forest, around 40 km away. "Perhaps a mistake was made here. Chakia forest is not a natural habitat for wolves. It is likely that the same wolves have returned and are carrying out these attacks to seek revenge," Singh said.

Kathmandu: Nepal Prime Minister K P Sharma Oli on Wednesday emphasised that unpredictable weather patterns and natural disasters, exacerbated by climate change, can pose a significant threat to citizens' ability to exercise their right to vote, as he underscored the need for election officials to adapt and ensure the integrity of democratic processes.

"Issues like climate change, migration and the

rise of social media and the role of artificial intelligence are crucial for our democracies," Oli said at the inauguration of the 12th conference of the Forum of Election Management Bodies of South Asia (FEMBOSA) here.

"Unpredictable weather patterns and natural disasters due to climate change threaten our ability to ensure that every citizen can exercise their right to vote... Climate change is not only an issue related to the environment. it touches every

facet of our society," he said. "The movement of people across borders and within, and within our countries have profound implications for electoral rolls, voter identification, and the right to vote," Oli pointed out at the two-day conference with the theme, "Emerging trend in elections: Climate change, so-

cial media and migration." Oli noted that social media and Artificial Intelligence are revolutionising the way politicians engage with voters and conduct elections. While these tools offer unparalleled opportunities for outreach and participation, they also bring risks such as misinformation, disinformation, fake news and manipulation that can erode trust in our democratic institutions, he

"As we embrace these technologies, we must do so with caution and a steadfast commitment to upholding the highest standards of transparency and accountability," the prime minister

A report 'Evolving Role of National Mapping Agencies - Transitioning to Geospatial Knowledge Infrastructure', released recently by Geospatial World – a think tank in space and geospatial technologies, cited examples of collaborations by national mapping agencies and the private sector in countries such as Germany, Switzerland, Canada, Singapore and the US.

as the one witnessed last week, highlights the urgent need to reassess urban planning and infrastructure resilience. This scenario underscores the need for robust and scalable emergency response strategies that can handle the complexities of concurrent extreme events, researchers at IIT Gandhinagar's

Parts of Gujarat witnessed flooding due to heavy rains between August 20 and 29. During this period, 15 out of the 33 districts in the state recorded three-day rainfall totals exceeding their 10-year return period - a statistical measure indicating the average interval between such intense events - with Jamnagar, Morbi, Devbhumi Dwarka, and Rajkot experiencing levels above their 50-year thresholds.

Machine Intelligence and Resilience Laboratory (MIR Lab) said.

"As rapid urbanisation continues to modify regional and local hydrology, placing greater strain on drainage systems, it is crucial to keep hydrology at the core of urban development strategies," the researchers observed.

Vadodara, which grappled with severe flooding after heavy rains last week, suffered from the situation despite rains not being unprecedented in magnitude, the IIT-GN research said.

"However, the flooding was likely exacerbated by extensive urban development in flood-prone areas, altered elevations, and drainage patterns compro-



mised due to rapid urbanisation and clogged drainage systems," it said.

"This situation is a classic example of concurrent extreme events, where multiple regions experience severe weather simultaneously. Such concurrence complicates emergency response and evacuation efforts as resources become stretched across multiple affected areas," the study said.

Demands for rescue, relief, and evacuation operations in such a scenario can overwhelm emergency services, making it more challenging to respond effectively and efficiently to the over two-day periods, with 17 districts exceeding the 10-year return period, including Jamnagar, Morbi, and Devbhumi Dwarka, where rainfall surpassed 50-year return levels. Additionally, 15 districts recorded three-day rainfall totals exceeding the 10year return period, with Jamnagar, Morbi, Devbhumi Dwarka, and Rajkot all experiencing levels above their 50-vear thresholds.

Francis urges Indonesia to fight extremism

Jakarta (Indonesia): Pope Francis urged Indonesia to live up to its promise of "harmony in diversity and fight religious intolerance on Wednesday, as he set a rigorous pace for an 11-day, four-nation trip through tropical Southeast Asia and Oceania that will test his stamina and health.

Francis had a packed first full day in Indonesia, meeting with outgoing President Joko Widodo and other Indonesian authorities at the presidential palace and then greeting Catholic priests, nuns and seminarians at Jakarta's main cathedral in the afternoon.

Cannons boomed as Francis joined Widodo on the veranda of the palace along with President-elect Prabowo Subianto. A marching band, stiff-legged troops and children in traditional Indonesian dress welcomed the first pope to visit in 35 years.

In his remarks to the Indonesian authorities, Francis compared the country's human diversity to the archipelago's 17,000 islands. He said each one contributes something specific to form "a magnificent mosaic, in which each tile is an irreplaceable element in creating a great original and precious work."

And yet, Francis warned that such diversity can also become a source of conflict. It was an apparent reference to episodes of intolerance that have flared in recent years in Indonesia as well as a broader concern

"This wise and delicate balance, between the multiplicity of cultures and different ideological visions, and the ideals that cement unity, must be continuously defended against imbalances," Francis said. Political leaders, he said, had a particular role to play but he also assured Widodo of the Catholic Church's commitment to increasing interreligious dialogue.

"This is indispensable for meeting common challenges, including that of countering extremism and intolerance, which through the distortion of religion attempt to impose their views by using deception and violence.

comed, not rejected. Farther afield, Indonesia has long been a strong supporter of Palestinians and the government has regularly condemned Israel's war in Gaza. Widodo thanked Francis for the Vatican's support of Palestinians since the start of the war.

"War will not benefit anyone, war will only bring suffering and misery to the common people," Widodo said. "Therefore let us celebrate the differences that we have Let us accept each other and strengthen tolerance to realize peace, to realize a better world for all humanity."Francis arrived in Jakarta on Tuesday to kick off the longest, farthest and most difficult trip of his pontificate given his myriad health problems. At 87, he uses a wheelchair, has regular bouts of bronchitis and has had multiple surgeries for intestinal

By the trip's end on September 13, Francis will have flown 32,814 kilometers to visit Indonesia, Papua New Guinea, East Timor and Singapore, one of the longest papal trips ever in terms of days on the road and distances traveled.

Another migrant boat seen near France

Wimereux: Just a day after 12 migrants died in a failed effort to cross the English Channel aboard a small inflatable, another boat carrying several dozen people appears to be making another crossing attempt from the coast of northern France on Wednesday, seemingly trying to head toward Britain.

Associated Press journalists on a beach in Wimereux, on the northern French coastline and close to the site of Tuesday's deadly sinking, broadcast live video of an inflatable boat crowded with people, seemingly migrants, out at sea.

The boat is so laden that some of those aboard, crammed side-by-side on the inflatable tubes, have their legs over the sides.

Many are wearing orange life preservers. A small patrol boat flying a French flag approached the inflatable at one point and a crew person aboard then tossed more orange life vests — about half a dozen of them — to people aboard the vessel, who caught them.

Another larger patrol vessel with a French tricol-

our stripe on its side - identified by maritime authorities as the French Gendarmerie's coastal patrol vessel Armoise — is shadowing the inflatable from a distance away. The French maritime agency that oversees that stretch of the channel confirmed to the AP that an operation was underway to monitor the inflatable, in case it runs into difficulty or the people aboard request assistance. The agency said that the Armoise was involved in that operation, accompanied by its own smaller boat that it carries with it.

The gray seas of the English Channel are comparatively calm, with small waves lapping against the beach, where people are strolling and walking dogs.

Waterlogged Aspirations

India's monsoon season, once a lifeline for agriculture and water supply, has increasingly turned into a source of recurring disaster. The recent flooding across Kerala, Gujarat, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Maharashtra, and other states has once again exposed the country's disjointed and inadequate flood preparedness. India's need for a unified flood response has never been more pressing.

Gujarat's relentless rains submerged cities like Surat and Rajkot, overwhelming outdated drainage systems and displacing thousands. More than 35 people lost their lives in both Andhra Pradesh and Telangana and nearly 50,000 people displaced due to the rain and flood fury. In Maharashtra, not just Pune district and western Maharashtra, but usually parched areas like Marathwada faced overflowing dams and inundated low-lying areas. Despite these annual devastations, India's central and state governments continue to respond with a patchwork of efforts that fall short of the coordinated and comprehensive strategy needed to protect lives and livelihoods.

This year's floods are part of a long-standing pattern. Flooding in India is a recurring crisis, worsened by climate change, urban expansion, and deforestation. With over 75% of India's rainfall concentrated in the monsoon, the National Disaster Management Authority notes that inadequate water management turns potential resources into catastrophic floods. Despite this, flood management remains marred by fragmented policymaking. The National Flood Management Programme, aimed at enhancing early warning systems and building resilient infrastructure, remains stalled by funding shortfalls and delays, with project completion rates under 50% as of 2023.

Gujarat's Tapi Riverfront Development Project in Surat exemplifies these issues. Launched in 2013 to create a flood-resilient city, it has suffered repeated delays, leaving critical flood control measures incomplete. Similarly, Andhra Pradesh's Polavaram Project, intended to mitigate flooding from the Godavari River, is still unfinished after a decade, hindered by funding disputes and environmental clearance delays. In Maharashtra, the management of dams like Varasgaon and Panshet has been criticized for poor flood controls, while Mumbai's Brihanmumbai Storm Water Disposal System (BRIMSTOWAD), intended to revamp the city's drainage network, remains incomplete over two decades after its inception.

In a bid to improve flood management across India, the central government is contemplating making the enactment of floodplain zoning legislation a prerequisite for states to access funds under the Flood Management and Border Areas Programme (FMBAP). However, only four states—Manipur, Rajasthan, Uttarakhand, and the erstwhile Jammu & Kashmir—have complied with repeated reminders to implement such laws.

The core issue lies in the disconnect between India's central and state governments. Water management is a state responsibility, yet critical projects often depend on central funding and expertise. This fragmentation results in a lack of a coherent national flood policy, with states competing for funds without a unified approach.

Malayalam Cinema Caught in the Crosshairs

alayalam cinema has long served as a vibrant mirror to Kerala's society, deeply intertwined with the daily lives of Malayalis. The film industry's actors are cherished figures across the globe, akin to family members. Thus, when the Hema Committee report shook the industry, the repercussions extended far beyond cinema enthusiasts, affecting the entire Kerala community.

The controversy traces back to 2017, when a leading actress was assaulted by a group of assailants, implicating a prominent actor. This incident spurred the formation of the Women in Cinema Collective (WCC), which petitioned the Kerala government to address systemic issues facing women in the industry. In response, then-Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan established a committee led by retired Justice Hema, with veteran actress Sarada and retired IAS officer K. B. Val-

sala Kumari. The committee was tasked with investigating these concerns.

The Hema Committee submitted its report on December 31, 2019, but it remained unpublished, with no concrete action taken by the government throughout Vijayan's tenure until July 2024. Following a State Information Commission order on July 6, the Kerala government was directed to release the report, redacting sensitive details. By August 19, 2024, only 233 pages of the report were made public, with several key sections withheld.

The release of the report has led to a flurry of new allegations, including claims against prominent actors such as Jayasurya, Mukesh (a CPIM MLA), Idavela Babu, and Baburaj.

Jayasurya, a self-made star of Malayalam cinema, faces accusations from two complainants alleging that he attempted to hold and kiss them without consent. Allegations against Jayasurya surfaced just as he was tasting success, winning the Kerala State Film Award for Best Actor and had a major project lined up which purports to be one of South India's most expensive films to date.

These accusations have overshadowed serious issues like the role of the drug mafia in the Malayalam film industry, underplayed by the Hema Committee. The intense focus on Jayasurya, who is independent and unaffiliated with influential lobbies, has fuelled speculation about ulterior motives.

Unlike others, Jayasurya's independence from influential lobbies and his spiritual beliefs may have made him a target. Media scrutiny and a coordinated smear campaign, including branding him as a 'toilet star' suggest an orchestrated effort to tarnish his reputation. This disproportionate focus on him raises questions about possible ulterior motives or media sensationalism.

A long-standing rape allegation against veteran actor Siddique has resurfaced, while new accusations against filmmaker Ranjith—alleging homosexual assault

and the dissemination of compromising photos—have emerged. In response, the government has formed a seven-member special investigation team, and the leadership of the Malayalam film actors association (A.M.M.A.), led by Mohanlal, has resigned amid growing scrutiny.

The women's wing of Jamaat-e-Islami quickly called for a thorough investigation and urged young male stars to take a stand, suggesting an orchestrated effort behind the scenes. The focus on Jayasurya, a celebrated actor with no ties to influential lobbies, has raised questions. The media's disproportionate attention to his case, overshadowing other serious issues such as the drug mafia's influence, hints at a potential ulterior motive. Jayasurya's independence and spiritual beliefs may have made him a target in a broader scheme to discredit him.

This crisis appears to be part of a larger agenda to control Malayalam cinema, with actor Mohanlal—known for his nationalist leanings—emerging as a significant obstacle. The ongoing smear campaign against Mohanlal, alongside new allegations against various actors including Jayasurya, appears part of a broader strategy to undermine his influence and dismantle his support network.

This turmoil seems to echo tactics used in the Jasmine Revolution and other uprisings, combining issues like sexual assault, gender discrimination, and corruption to create widespread unrest. Recent allegations against ADGP Ajithkumar, a close ally of Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan, further suggest an orchestrated effort to destabilize state institutions and public trust.

This unfolding crisis should be seen not as isolated incidents but as a deliberate effort to provoke societal discord and shift power dynamics within the industry and beyond.

The turmoil within the Malayalam film industry may be a precursor to a larger upheaval reminiscent of the Jasmine Revolution and other recent uprisings. Allegations against high-profile figures and the timing of these accusations suggest a coordinated attempt to undermine public trust in Kerala's institutions and government.

This scenario calls for heightened vigilance and a serious response to prevent the destabilization seen in other regions.

Kerala, like the rest of India, must guard against these destabilizing tactics. The central government must address the drug mafia's influence in the Malayalam film industry and halt radical Islamization to ensure a safe, secular, and dignified work environment for all professionals.

Dr. K. L. Shrimali: The Unsung Hero of Indian Education

Thile history is filled with many influential figures, they eventually fade from public memory. However, there are a few whose legacies continue to shape the nation. One such figure is Dr. Kalu Lal Shrimali, India's second education minister. Surprisingly, his legacy has been overlooked, a recent inaccurate claim by a prominent Rajya Sabha MP and former Deputy CM claim on social media that India's first five Education Ministers were from the Muslim community. This Teachers' Day, we revisit the life and work of Dr. Shrimali—a Hindu Brahmin born in 1909 in Udaipur, Rajasthan. He served under the Prime Ministership of Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru. He passed away on

5th January 2000.

It is both surprising and disheartening to witness how quickly a figure like Dr. Shrimali, who was hailed by President Dr. Pranab Mukherjee as the forefather of Indian education, has been so quickly forgotten. This Teachers' Day, we remember the man who introduced 'Teachers' Day' in schools to honour his predecessor, Dr.

Dr. Shrimali, a distinguished educationist and parliamentarian, made significant contributions as the Union Minister of Education for the Government of India from 1955 to 1963. He completed his education at Banaras Hindu University, Calcutta University, and Columbia University in New York, establishing a strong academic foundation that fuelled his passion for education reforms in India.

His tenure as the Education Minister was marked by a deep commitment to educational reform and institution-building. Dr. Shrimali's legacy as a 'forefather' of Indian education is rooted in his visionary approach, which sought to balance the need for modernisation with the cultural and social context of India.



Dr. Shrimali was instrumental in the establishment and expansion of several higher education institutions. Under his leadership, the Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) were further developed and new ones were established, laying the groundwork for what would become India's premier technical education institutions.

He supported the creation of the University Grants Commission (UGC) Act of 1956. This Act empowered the UGC to oversee and regulate higher education in India, ensuring the maintenance of standards, the promotion of research and quality education.

Recognising the need for a skilled workforce to drive India's industrialisation, Dr. K.L. Shrimali emphasised the importance of technical and vocational education. He championed the establishment of Regional Engineering Colleges (RECs), which were precursors to the National Institutes of Technology (NITs), to address the regional imbalances in access to quality technical education.

He was an advocate for adult education and literacy, particularly in rural areas. He promoted several literacy programs aimed at reducing the high illiteracy rates in the coun-

try, believing that education was a key driver of social and economic

Beyond his ministerial duties, Dr. Shrimali was actively involved with various educational institutions. He founded the iconic Vidhya Bhavan in Udaipur and social welfare organisations like the Seva Mandir. He was the editor of Jan Shikshan, a monthly educational magazine. He also authored several publications where he highlighted the challenges and opportunities in Indian education, influencing public opinion and policy discussions. In 1963, he resigned from the Congress. However, his passion for education continued. After resigning from the ministry, he served as the Vice Chancellor of Mysore University and Banaras Hindu University.

Dr. Shrimali played a key role in implementing the recommendations of the Secondary Education Commission (1952-1953) and prepared the groundwork for future reforms that included the Kothari Commission's report (1964-1966). His advocacy for the three-language formula and the importance of moral and character education helped shape the curriculum and policy directions that India would follow for decades. His contributions to education were recognised through numerous awards and honours, including the prestigious Padma Vibhushan in 1976. His work continues to be celebrated.

A Political Earthquake in Germany

ermany is no stranger to political turbulence, but the recent state elections in Thuringia and Saxony marked an unprecedented shift. For the first time since World War II, a right-wing populist party has emerged as a significant political force, shaking the foundations of German politics. The Alternative for Germany (AfD) has won in Thuringia with 32.8% of the vote, while in Saxony, the Christian Democratic Union (CDU) narrowly held onto first place with 31.8%, just ahead of the AfD's 30.8%. This electoral earthquake has sent shockwaves through the political establishment, raising questions about the future of Germany's democracy and the federal coalition led by Chancellor Olaf Scholz

Chancellor Olaf Scholz.

The AfD's rise in Saxony and Thuringia is not merely a regional phenomenon but resonates with a deeper, more disquieting historical undertone. Thuringia and Saxony, part of the former East Germany, have long harboured a sense of disillusionment with mainstream politics, stemming from a legacy of economic hardship and a perceived neglect by the political elite in Berlin.

However, the surge of the AfD, classified as 'right-wing extremist' by domestic intelligence, evokes chilling memories of Germany's pre-1945 history, when economic de-

spair and political fragmentation paved the way for the rise of the Nazi party. The AfD's anti-immigrant, nationalist rhetoric has drawn comparisons to those darker times, prompting urgent calls for political containment, or the so-called 'Brandmauer' (firewall), by mainstream parties.

The recent elections underscored the growing discontent with traditional parties. In Thuringia, the AfD emerged as the largest party, while the CDU finished a distant second with 23.8%. In Saxony, although the CDU narrowly edged out the AfD, the rightward drift of CDU ministerpresident Michael Kretschmer signaled a broader shift within the conservative camp. The newly formed populist-left Sahra Wagenknecht Alliance (BSW) also made significant inroads, finishing third in both states, reflecting a volatile electorate disillusioned with the federal government's policies

The results have left the federal coalition in disarray. Chancellor Scholz's Social Democrats (SPD), the Greens, and the Free Democrats (FDP) were all but obliterated, with their combined vote share falling below 15% in both states. The Greens and FDP failed to clear the 5% threshold in Thuringia, crashing out of the state parliament entirely.

The far-right's resurgence poses a critical test for German democracy. Voter turnout was notably high, with three-quarters of eligible voters casting their ballots, suggesting that disillusionment has not dampened democratic engagement but rather intensified it. Among young voters, support for the AfD was particularly striking, with 37% in Thuringia and 31% in Saxony.

This generational shift further underscored the urgency for mainstream parties to address voters' concerns on issues like immigration, economic insecurity, and national identity if they wish to retain their grip on the electorate.

Writing in The Guardian, acclaimed historian Katja Hoyer observed that while there are good reasons to place a political firewall around the extremists, mainstream parties must also address the electorate's loss of trust.

"Immigration tops the list, followed by energy prices, war and the economy. The word I heard over and over again in recent months was angst. Given that a growing number of immigrants are being charged with violent crimes, which are on the rise, many feel this is an issue of safety," said Hoyer, in her opinion piece.

Strategies for Prevention of Violence in Healthcare

Reports of physical and verbal violence at healthcare institutes are regularly reported across India. In some instances, mobs have resorted to arson, destroying costly equipment. An Indian Medical Association (IMA) study found that over 75% of doctors have faced workplace violence. The ghastly rape and murder of a resident doctor at Kolkatta's R.G. Kar hospital stands out as one of the most gruesome of these.

Violence against healthcare professionals in India is severe, with over 75% of doctors affected. Despite a promised central Act, no legislation has been enacted. Maharashtra's new security measures, including deploying personnel and installing CCTV cameras, show promise. **Part 2** of this series will explore additional solutions.

Despite the Union Health Minister's promise of a central act to prevent such violence, no legislation has been enacted.

Violence against doctors is not exclusive to India. In the US, Dr. Michael Davidson, director of endovascular cardiac surgery at Brigham and Women's Hospital, was killed by Stephen Pasceri, who blamed Dr. Davidson for his mother's death. Similarly, violence against nurses in the US is commonplace. According to a study, nearly a million attacks, some extremely violent, against healthcare institutes are reported in China annually.

To prevent such violence, almost 29 states in India, including Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh, Kerala, Punjab, and Delhi, have enacted legal provisions in the last few years. As per this Act, violence means activities causing any harm, injury, or endangering the life or intimidation, obstruction, or hindrance to any healthcare service person in the discharge of duty in the healthcare service institution or damage or loss to property in the healthcare service institution. The healthcare service persons include registered medical practitioners working in healthcare institutions (including those having provisional registration), registered nurses, medical students, nursing students, and para-medical workers employed and working in medical service institutions. The Act provides stringent punishment, including imprisonment and a fine, as well as double the amount of damage as compensation to the institute. These stringent legal provisions do not permit bail for the accused. The Act also allows patients to lodge criminal complaints against doctors if they feel aggrieved. The Acts have not effectively deterred attackers, with few convictions reported.

Dr. Neeraj Nagpal, Medico-Legal Action Group, argues that a central act alone will not suffice. He suggests changes in the Indian Penal Code. In his opinion, the arrest of doctors under Section 304A of The



IPC is a part of the problem of violence against doctors because invariably cross-FIRs are registered by the patient party and the doctor, which results in an inevitable compromise.

In public general hospitals, violence is usually targeted against young resident doctors. Analysis shows that incidents often happen during emergencies when senior doctors are absent and medical equipment is unavailable or not working. In a few incidents, resident doctors were reported to be under the influence of alcohol and allegedly misbehaved with their relatives.

Given these repeated violent incidents, I was tasked with devising a scheme for medical colleges-cumhospitals run by the State Government of Maharashtra and Mumbai Corporation. With the medical superintendents, we noticed that trouble ignites in the emergency departments, or if a patient dies. Our resolution involved deploying armed contingents from the Maharashtra Security Force (MSF), equipping them with training and communication tools, and installing CCTV cameras, and restricting access. These measures have improved safety and a better focus on treatment for resident doctors.

These measures are just the beginning of a comprehensive approach. In part 2, we will explore additional solutions, including advanced security protocols, the role of training, and innovative practices to protect healthcare professionals and institutions further.

Philadelphi Corridor: Block in Israel-Hamas Talks



mid the outrage over the gruesome murder of six Israeli hostages by the militant Palestinian faction Hamas and the paralyzing protests in Israel, the Philadelphi Corridor, a narrow strip of land along the Egypt-Gaza border, has come into focus.

Stretching about 14 kilometres and separating the Egyptian Sinai from the southern Gaza Strip, control over the Philadelphi Corridor has become a flashpoint in Israeli-Hamas relations especially after Israel's withdrawal from Gaza in 2005.

Originally established as a buffer zone under the Oslo Accords, the corridor has since evolved into a major smuggling route, with a network of tunnels used by Hamas to transport weapons, militants, and goods into Gaza—stoking the conflict that has kept the peace process in a state of perpetual deadlock.

In 2005, Israel's unilateral disengagement plan, implemented under

then Prime Minister Ariel Sharon, saw the removal of Israeli troops and settlements from Gaza, but the strategic importance of the corridor did not diminish. Israel retained control over Gaza's airspace, territorial waters, and border crossings, including the corridor, to monitor and restrict the flow of arms into the Strip.

Israel's blockade of Gaza, aimed at restricting the flow of weapons to Hamas, turned the corridor into a critical supply line for the militant group. However, when Hamas violently took control of Gaza in 2007, ousting the Fatah-led Palestinian Authority, the smuggling networks along the Philadelphi Corridor expanded rapidly. Despite numerous Egyptian efforts to curb smuggling, including the construction of barriers and the flooding of tunnels, the corridor remains a key entry point for arms into Gaza. For Hamas, these smuggling routes are not just a means of military supply but also a vital economic lifeline, circumventing Israel's stringent blockade and maintaining the group's authority in the Strip.

The corridor's strategic importance makes it a central issue in Israel-Hamas negotiations. Israel insists that any lasting peace agreement must include stringent measures to cut off Hamas's access to weapons smuggling, which runs directly through the Philadelphi

Corridor. Conversely, Hamas views the corridor as a necessary channel for circumventing what it considers an illegal blockade that strangles the Gazan economy. This fundamental disagreement has proven a major stumbling block in peace talks, with Israel demanding tighter security controls and Hamas refusing any measures that could threaten its military capabilities.

The killings of the six Israeli hostages, carried out amid ongoing negotiations, have sent shockwaves through Israel, hardening its stance on security and deepening mistrust of Hamas. For Israeli officials, the murders are a stark reminder of Hamas' unrelenting hostility and the dangers of any perceived concession. In previous rounds of violence, such as the 2014 Gaza War, tunnels under the Philadelphi Corridor were used by Hamas to launch attacks into Israel, underscoring the strategic threat posed by this porous border

The Philadelphi Corridor now stands as a symbol of the intractability of the Israel-Hamas conflict. As long as the corridor remains a conduit for weapons and a point of contention, progress in peace talks is likely to be elusive. The murders of the Israeli hostages have only reinforced the corridor's role as a critical, if often overlooked, roadblock in the peace process.

Paris: World champion Sachin Khilari clinched a silver in men's shot put F46 event with an Asian record distance of 16.32m as the country's track-and-field athletes continued their unprecedented medal-winning run in the Paralympic Games here on Wednesday.

The 34-year-old Khilari achieved his best throw of the day in his second attempt to better his own Asian record of 16.30m which he set while winning gold in the World Para-Athletics Championships in Japan in May.

However, the effort, which was also his personal best, was not enough for the top honour as Greg Stewart of Canada defended his Tokyo Paralympics gold with a throw of 16.38m. Luka Bakovic of Croatia took the bronze with 16.27m.

Khilari's silver is the 11th medal from para-athletics in the ongoing Games and took India's overall tally to 21, including three gold.

Stewart had finished second to Khilari in the World Para-Athletics Championships in Kobe in May, and the tables were turned at Stade de France on Wednesday

F46 classification is for athletes with arm deficiency, impaired muscle power or impaired passive range of movement in arms, with athletes competing in a standing position.

Late on Tuesday night, Indians won silver and bronze in both men's high jump T63 and javelin throw F46 after Deepthi Jeevanji's bronze in the women's 400m T20 category.

Sharad Kumar and Mariyappan Thangavelu won silver and bronze respectively in the men's high jump T63 while Ajeet Singh and Sundar Singh Gurjar took the second and third sports in the javelin throw F46 final.



A mechanical engineering degree holder, Khilari, who had also won a gold in last year's Asian Para Games in China, has an impaired left hand. Hailing from a farming family at Karagani village in Maharashtra's Sangli district, Khilari met with an accident during his school days. The injury resulted in gangrene of the skin on his elbow and muscle atrophy. Even after several surgeries, his arm never recovered.

He also lost his mother when he was young. Despite all these setbacks, he took up javelin while he was studying to become an engineer. A shoulder injury during competition forced him to switch to shot put

Khilari was introduced to para sports in 2015 and later met well-known coach Satayanarayana who supported him in improving his

He also worked as a visiting faculty member at various institutions, assisting students in their

UPSC and Maharashtra Public Service examination preparations.

The previous best show by India's track and field contingent in a single Paralympics was in Tokyo when it won one gold, five silver and two bronze medals.

Bengaluru: Rishabh Pant's red-ball return will be closely monitored but the national selectors will also trace suitable backup options to frontline stars when Duleep Trophy, which preludes an important Test season, begins across Bengaluru and Anantapur on Thursday.

Pant, who returned to white-ball formats after that horrific car crash, is yet to play in a longer-duration match. His last red-ball outing was against Bangladesh in December 2022.

Now, he will turn out for Abhimanyu Easwaran-led Team B against Shubman Gill-captained Team A at the Chinnaswamy Stadium.

Satisfying his outings in the shorter versions were, but this four-day tournament offers him a unique challenge - batting and 'keeping for an undefined number of overs.

Pant is the designated stumper in Team B, and it is



evident that the Ajit Agarkar-led selection panel is intending to take a deep look into his role as the wicketkeeper-batter in a season that will culminate with the World Test Championship Final at the Lord's next June.

But that is just one piece of the puzzle as other worthy contenders are there for the wicketkeeper-batter's

The front-runner is Dhruv Jurel (Team A), who was impressive in his debut series against England earlier this year.

Then there's Ishan Kishan, who will play for Team D which is marshalled by Shreyas Iyer at Anantapur.

Kishan, though a long shot, will be eager to use Duleep Trophy as a platform to stake his claim for an India return after an unsavoury train of incidents saw him losing the BCCI central contract in the current cycle.

The return of veterans Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma for the Bangladesh series will gobble up two batting slots along with Gill at No. 3.

Hence, there will be a jostle between KL Rahul, Shreyas Iyer, Sarfaraz Khan, who impressed all with an excellent Test debut against England, for settling into the available middleorder space.

It's imperative for Rahul, who is in Team A as a pure batter, and Shreyas to come good in Duleep Trophy as they missed a large chunk of the home matches against England - the former with an injury and the latter was dropped after the second Test at Visakhapatnam.

Dark horses

There is a litany of fringe players who would want to give a further fillip to their career after showcasing talent at various levels.

Karnataka's Devdutt Padikkal had a roaring Ranii season in 2023-24, which earned him a Test debut against England at
